We travel, we go out, we leave our homes: just make sure your home is secure and let them think you're in! It's the same message with other seasonal events coming next month: Hallowe'en and Bonfire Night—even if you're just in your back garden for a family party make sure your home is secure: windows and doors all closed and locked!

- BEWARE of look-alike websites—even websites that are 'legitimate' businesses can charge a hefty fee for an otherwise free service from, for example, HM Government: a legitimate government website will have gov.uk in its web address.

# Is Chelmsford safe? Self-help and neighbourliness is key.

espite recent news in Chelmsford over the past few months, giving the impression of a city of violent crime, Chelmsford remains one of the safest places to live and work in the UK. If we go about our lives and business as decent and respectable citizens, it is very unlikely that we shall experience violent crime personally. What is more concerning is the rise in low-level antisocial incidents and more aggressive

antisocial behaviour in some localities. Self-help through Neighbourhood Watch is a key way of ensuring we reduce the risk to ourselves, our neighbourhoods and our communities.

Police resources are prioritised according to levels of **Threat**, **Harm**, and **Risk** presented, but it is very important that *all* incidents are reported to the police in order for a full and complete picture is built up: only with such a picture can we have any chance of raising these matters of concern to any effect with the police—and ultimately with Roger Hirst, the Police and Crime Commissioner (PCC) for Essex. After all, his declared priorities relate to all of these issues:

- More local, visible and accessible policing
- · Crack down on anti-social behaviour
- Breaking the cycle of domestic abuse
- Reverse the trend in serious violence
- Tackle gangs and organised crime
- Protecting children and vulnerable people
- Improve safety on our roads

# Homelessness, begging, and rough sleeping in Chelmsford

It is distressing for all concerned to see apparently homeless people on the streets of Chelmsford, and there seems to be an increase in it. It is quite natural—part of our humanity—to want to help. There are many genuine cases, and the City Council, voluntary organisations, and the police, have arrangements to intervene and help such people. We are advised that it doesn't help to give money to people on the streets, for several reasons: a number of people may not be genuinely homeless but work as 'professionals' or deliberate rough sleepers; some may be drug (including alcohol) users; a few can be aggressive.
